Senior Girl's netball (under 14s)







# Rememberance Day

On Thursday 11th November this year, Remembrance Day 2021 was a huge success, with a giant parade, hundreds of brave veterans and thousands of poppies.

Every year, on the 11th of November, at 11:00 (11:00, 11.11.21), a two-minute silence is held, in respect for the many lives taken in the fight for winning WW1 and as a moment of reflection for all those who now live free, thanks to the brave fighters of the war.


This year, over 10,000 veterans stood in the Cenotaph, London in their uniforms to pay their respects to the 40 million fallen soldiers and civilians from World War 1. Thousands of the public came to commemorate bravery and perseverance from over a century ago.

> One of the biggest and most recognisable elements of Remembrance Day is the poppies. It is considered respectful to wear a paper poppy around the week of Remembrance, but why?

> After the end of WW1, No Man's Land was lifeless and littered with debris. Scarlet corn poppies, adapted to grow naturally in disturbed soil, began to grow all over the land, covering the ground. The beautiful flowers and their vibrant colour became a symbol of the devastating effects of war and the newfound pece on the battlefield after the war, and now people wear them to show how they remember and respect the lost lives. The selling of the poppies also helps raise money for veteran's charities.

So, when November 2022 comes around next year, make sure to wear a poppy and remember the soldiers and civilians who gave their lives for you and your family to live a war-free, peaceful and plentiful life.
