- take things slowly friendships can take time to develop


TRANSITION LEADERS






FINDING YOUR WAY AROUND

ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE FIRST DAY OF TERM:

Please bring with you the equipment you will need to start your first day at school. (Over the page you will find information that guides you with this.) *You must be in your full school uniform!*

Meet on the tennis courts as you did on Induction Day at 8:30am. You will then be taken to the hall in your Tutor Groups. It is vital that as you enter the hall you are silent; *the Headteacher and Senior Staff will be expecting this.*

During the first part of the morning you will spend some time getting to know each other again in your tutor groups and then you will start your school timetable. You will be the only year group in school on the first day, which will help you to settle in and find your way around.



When the rest of the school returns on Tuesday 6th September, you will have an earlier lunch time for the first few days to give you plenty of time to buy your lunch before the rest of the school.

TUTOR GROUPS

There are 12 tutor groups of approximately 30 students in Year 7. Each tutor group has a tutor who will stay with their Year 7 tutor group until they leave in Year 11.

Your tutor will meet with you at the start of every day during registration. They will be the first person you see every morning to make sure you start your day positively. They are there to support you socially and academically. If you are ever worried or stuck, your tutor will be the first person for you to go to for help.

In tutor time you will have a different activity to complete every day. This might include, organising and checking your planner, a reading activity, or having a discussion about topical issues in our community and wider world. Once a week you and your tutor group will go to an assembly in the Hall.

Your Director of Progress and Achievement (DOPA), Mr Clissold will work with you right through your school career.

COMMUNICATION BETWEEN HOME AND SCHOOL

Your student planner: This is an important way for you, your parents and your teachers to communicate. It contains information about self-study, Eref points, letters home, important dates, examinations, your targets and detentions. It is very important that you bring it to school every day.

Progress and Performance: The school regularly monitors your progress and collates subject and attitude information up to three times a year. This is known as WAD (Wildern Assessment Data).

Parents' Evenings: You and your parents will be invited to meet your Tutor during the Autumn Term to discuss how you are settling in and the progress being made. There will be another parents' evening later in the school year to review your progress with your subject teachers.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

All students are expected to uphold the high standards of the school. This is especially applicable to uniform. It is our belief that if students are appropriately dressed for school, they are in the correct mind-set for learning and the expectations this brings.

If a student is wearing incorrect uniform, they will be told to correct it for the next school day and a mark will be placed on their uniform tracker. Each time a row is completed on the tracker, a sanction is put in place. Should uniform breaches happen on a regular basis, parents will be asked to attend a meeting with the DOPA to discuss a way forward as this is seen as persistent defiance.

- No other piercing is permitted in school.
- If you allow your son or daughter to have additional piercings, please arrange for these to be done at the start of the school summer holidays so that there is no need for retainers when they return to school in September. No piercings that require retainers should be undertaken at any other time of the school year, as they will not be permitted.
- The wearing of any other jewellery, including wrist bangles either by girls or boys is not permitted. The only badges that may be worn are those issued by the school.

Coats

Outdoor coat of plain colour and unpatterned material is preferable. Coats should be waterproof, hooded tops, tracksuit type jackets and other outdoor clothing of this type, particularly if emblazoned with logos/motifs or large lettering are not acceptable. Coats should always be worn over school jumpers, not as a replacement, and should be removed when indoors.

PROHIBITED/BANNED ITEMS


The following items are not allowed in school:

- Knives and other weapons
- Drugs (other than prescription medication that is kept with first aid by arrangement)
- Drug paraphernalia
- Aerosol sprays
- Tippex and solvents
- Chewing gum
- Energy Drinks, including Lucozade
- Cigarettes, tobacco and other smoking paraphernalia e.g E Cigarettes
- Students are also advised not to bring cash or valuable possessions into school, as we cannot accept responsibility for loss or damage.
- Mobile Phones, iPads, MP3 Player, headphones and airpods should not be visible. Such equipment, if brought into school, should be kept in the students' school bag. (If such equipment is used without permission or it is seen around the school site during break times and lunch times, it will be confiscated and if a repeat offence parents or carers will be required to collect the item from reception).

Mobile phones and electrical devices are not allowed to be seen, used or heard during the school day (between 8:30am and 3pm).

Students are expected to put away all electrical devices and accessories (including headphones). If they are seen by any member of staff they will be confiscated and stored in the main office until the end of the school day and a negative e-ref will be awarded.



If an opportunity arises under the guidance of staff, your phone can be used and you will be permitted to take them out during the lesson.

The school day begins at **8.30am** and is divided into 5 teaching periods of 60 minutes with registration and tutor time in the morning.

BREAK AND LUNCHTIME ARRANGEMENTS:

The school provides an extensive range of food, which is sold in several locations around the school. You can buy a range of hot and cold food. **All students must eat in the set areas.**

As we have a large school and there are over 2000 students and staff walking around during the break times, it is very important that you walk at all times. Sports and running games can take place on the hard courts which are open every break and lunch time.

During breaks there will be lunchtime supervisors, supported by members of staff around the school site. If you require any help please see one of them straight away.







THE TIMETABLE

A timetable helps you know where you should be and when.

The school week consists of 25 lessons. Each one is an hour in length. The timetable will run over two weeks and will tell you your lessons for those two weeks. You will notice that not all lessons are the same in both weeks, so read it carefully.

For each lesson the timetable tells you the subject you will study, the room you will be in and the teacher you will have.

Self Study

Self-study is set frequently with a weekly or fortnightly deadline. In Year 7 and 8 tasks set should take up to 30 minutes to complete per subject area.

Here are some examples of potential self-study tasks at KS3:

- Google Quiz
- Vocabulary learning
- Extended reading with comprehension questions
- Kahoot
- Quizlet
- Practice papers (Self marking)

Self Study tasks are designed to extend your learning beyond the classroom, encourage independent learning and develop the Wildern Attributes. (Determination, Curiosity, Pride, Reflection, Respect and Kindness.) You will be expected to complete self-study tasks and meet deadlines.

Subjects will begin to set self-study tasks to you at different times during Year 7 to ensure you don't feel overwhelmed and have time to adjust to independent study.

The Wildern House Championship is a yearly competition which every student, and member of the school are involved in. The main principle is to promote participation, positive behaviour, and team work across all year groups.


There are six houses in total, and within these students individually and collectively compete to win points for their house. The house at the end of the year with the most points overall wins, and rewards are then given to every member in that house.




SCHOOL TRIPS:
