



Their web app covers 150+ exam board specific courses condensing what students need to know for their exams. The software is able to identify gaps in learning. For instance, when you get a question wrong, the platform will repeat the topic in different formats and their smart algorithm has proven to make students remember topics 2x faster. In February, Wildern took part in Safer Internet Day 2019. Celebrated globally each year, the aim of the day is to promote the safe and positive use of digital technology, inspiring conversations about how to use technology responsibly. The theme this year was 'consent' and saw Wildern students, during tutor time and in ICT lessons, discussing issues surrounding this theme.

Students were encouraged to think about what data they share with others and the possible consequences in an activity called 'To Share or Not to Share'. They were also encouraged to check Privacy settings on their mobile devices during the 'App Attack' activity. Some students used Google Cardboards to view a virtual reality home, using the Data Detective mobile app, to check for potential data security issues.

STEM Paid Internship for Teaching

Have you considered teaching and not sure that it's the right career choice for you?

A question that Economics and Finance Undergraduate (and part of the Uni Quidditch team) at the University of Southampton Sam Spencer had asked himself frequently.

Sam then took part in the Wildern Partnership STEM Paid Internship for Teaching, which confirmed his decision to train to teach.

Sam, a keen sportsman, had always been interested in teaching and worked with children in school holidays and weekends, as a sailing coach. The internship was a great way to gain experience in a school to inform his decision.

The internship is paid (£300 per week) and is a varied and exciting opportunity. There is never a dull day, which gives great insight into teaching. Here Sam provides a look into his working week,

"We received induction training and training on other aspects of teaching. We spent time with pupils, initially supporting teachers in the classroom and working with small groups of pupils, building up to some teaching towards the end of the internship. This was optional, but I felt confident enough after a few weeks to at least give it a go! We were also attached to a tutor group, so that we could gain insight into the pastoral role. I supported extra-curricular clubs such as the school STEM club, sports clubs and helped out during sports day. As a group of interns we carried out a small research project which we presented as a group during our final week. This was to engage us with research prior to applying to a teacher training programme. The internship lasted four weeks, but was flexible. For example, I had a commitment elsewhere for a few days and so I made up those few days at the end of the four weeks."

Following the completion of his Maths Internship for teaching last summer, Sam has now applied to the Wildern Partnership SCITT, has been accepted onto the Maths PGCE programme and is completing his final year at Uni, as well as a Maths subject knowledge enhancement and really looking forward to getting started in September 2019, as a trainee teacher.

NFER Parent Survey update ** NFER



Last academic year we asked parents to complete an online survey in order to gain some valuable insight into your views of Wildern School. We would like to take this opportunity to thank those parents that completed the survey and share with you some of the outcomes.

Learning:

Whilst many parents were happy with the level of homework their child was getting there were a small number that felt their child should be receiving more. In response to this we have re-evaluated our homework policy for this academic year. We now set "self study" to be completed outside of lessons. The self study tasks have been considered carefully across all departments to ensure consistency in quality and quantity. Communication:

As a school we work hard to ensure we effectively communicate with parents and guardians. In general, parents have welcomed the e mail system by which letters are sent, finding this a more suitable option. Our original Parent App had a mixed response and therefore we looked at alternatives to this. As a result we are planning to introduce PARS which we feel is a more user-friendly version.

The main area for development identified by parents was that of the lunch options. Many parents felt that there were limited healthy options for their child to choose from. This is not the case. Each lunch there is a wide variety of healthier options to choose from, including a much used salad bar. Based on this feedback we are now looking at how we can better inform and keep you up to date on the variety of food that is on offer to your child. The developments for behaviour were centred around consistency and communication. Parents felt that they wanted to be kept further informed regarding the outcome of investigations that had taken place. They also wanted further support from the school with regards to uniform and expectations; believing that consistency at school would make decisions and discussions at home easier. Both of these areas are aspects that the school are working on to improve further.
