
- We require advance payment on booking for all classes and are unable to reserve places without payment.

Work Starts on New Primary School

We are delighted that work on our new primary school has started, the foundations are being laid and the construction of the school is making excellent progress in readiness for opening in September 2019. The two-form entry school will open its gates to Reception children first and will eventually hold 420 children when it is full from Reception to Year 6. We are delighted to be part of this project and contributing even further to the educational offer within our community. Our commitment to our community has been a key driver in developing the Trust, our principle aim being to continue to provide high quality teaching in a stimulating environment.



We will continue to keep you posted on the progress of both of our new schools.

Emergency Procedures at Wildern School

All schools are required to have both an emergency evacuation procedure (primarily for fire evacuation) and a lock down procedure designed to keep everyone inside the building. At Wildern School we refer to this lock down procedure as our 'emergency procedures'.

The purpose of this procedure is to ensure the safety of all students, visitors and staff in the case of an emergency such as an intruder on site or a chemical spillage. However, at Wildern we mostly use this procedure to keep everyone inside in situations where we have a student who has been taken ill in a corridor or main thoroughfare or when an ambulance is coming on site at a time when students are due to be circulating outside. This ensures student safety at these times without disruption to learning.

The process for our emergency procedures is as follows:

- The fire bell sounds 10 distinct beeps (different from a fire evacuation alarm)
- All students and staff remain inside where they are and all windows and doors are locked to ensure student safety. Students remain supervised throughout.
- All staff are notified of the nature of the emergency through their school email.
- The end of emergency procedures is announced with 5 rings of the session bell.
- If emergency procedures are sounded at a break or lunchtime then students go directly to their next lesson where their teachers will be waiting to teach them.
- Where emergency procedures run over a break or lunchtime we will look to address this to ensure appropriate breaks are achieved where possible.
- Any student who has medication at a specific time will have their medication brought to them.

Naturally, to ensure that students remain familiar with both the emergency procedures and evacuation procedures it is essential that we conduct drills; especially since these procedures are, fortunately, rarely used.

As most teachers will tell you, there's no such thing as a 'typical' day at work. That's because no two days are the same – you are unlikely to ever lack variety. Teaching is a career that offers great benefits, opportunities to use a wide range of skills and inspire young people in the subjects you love.

Nearly a term into their teacher training year, our Primary and Secondary trainee teachers not only now have an awareness of the challenges and rewards of teaching as a career but, between them are starting to shape the lives of thousands of our local youngsters.

Under the expert supervision of their school mentors and the SCITT team, trainees are learning how to plan and teach, how to assess learning, adapt for the needs of their children, manage behaviours for maximum progress, as well as research for their Masters level study.

Of course teaching is not just about sharing a passion for the subjects you love, many trainees are also indulging in hobbies and interests as part of their course by getting involved in after-school clubs, trips and sport.

You may remember a truly brilliant teacher from school who made a real difference to your life. You may know someone who you think will be that truly brilliant teacher. If you do, put them in touch with us. The Wildern Partnership SCITT (School Centred Initial Teacher Training) offers local outstanding Primary and Secondary Masters level programmes.

We wish all of our trainees, and their mentors, a very peaceful Christmas break. It is well deserved!


The second place we went to was the escape room. When we were there we found out that the hacker had the numbers 4 and 9 in their worker number by solving problems that were pretty difficult.



On 29th June, Wildern School raised a colossal £800 for the Toilet Twinning project.


Organised and publicised by our fantastic Rights Respecting Focus Group and the Community Focus Group, there was lots going on 29th June 2018 to aid the fundraising for this fantastic project! Students learnt about the problems that arise through not having a clean and safe toilet to use in the WOW of the Week delivered in tutor sessions. Students paid £1 to wear non school uniform and they also baked and bought lots of delicious cakes - some were lucky enough to purchase the poo emoji themed cakes (!). There was even a Squat-a-Thon House Competition event which, despite the staggering heat was well supported by staff and students.

The charity were pleased to be able to build 13 toilets with the money we raised and said the following:

"Thank you for your fantastic fundraising. That's wonderful! The way twinning works is that in each country we work in there will be a local partner who goes into the villages - sometimes very remote places many hours drive away - and with permission and support from the villagers they teach about hygiene and latrine building and sometimes help by providing parts towards the latrines such as foot plates or plastic water bottles for hand washing. We find that this method of community led education works best as people take great pride in building and maintaining their latrines and it becomes a life skill which they can benefit from forever more".
