- In all subjects, teachers provided access to the lesson resources such as the presentation slides as well as worksheets/handouts to be used enabling the student to follow along and go back and revisit any concepts they were not as confident in learning
- Accessing Google quizzes and memory retrieval tests
- Creatively using extensions and websites such as Canva and Adobe Spark to produce visual representations of their learning
- Using a mind mapping site called Coggle to revise a topic and bring learning from a unit together making stunning revision resources they can use now and in the future
- Editing movies such as short adverts about a topic like promoting food safety issues in Technology or making documentaries about environmental issues in Geography

Keep Safe!

Despite the beginning of the second lockdown, the Eastleigh Youth Conference for 2020 was not cancelled, instead evolving (like most of us this year) to a digital format. On November 11th, a range of schools and colleges from the Hampshire area, including Wildern, came together to discuss some of the issues facing young people during these times.

Those of us taking part from Wildern spent the day in the LRC - our chromebooks giving us access to the conference. Joining calls with over 100 other students meant that the event still felt very lively and interactive, especially when taking the bustling text chat into account! We also split into smaller groups of around 10-20 students for our workshops, allowing the hosts to answer each student's questions directly.

The main focus of the day revolved around mental health, which was particularly relevant due to the experiences and stresses some of us may have faced during the first lockdown. The workshops themselves would specialise on a more specific topic, such as relationships or internet safety, and was run by an expert on the matter. This was a very valuable experience, as speaking with experts on subjects you may not naturally talk about can really help to give advice or clear-up misconceptions. At the end of the day, all of the groups came together to discuss our thoughts and what we would all take away from the day.

Stacey Miller, a specialist in drug and alcohol awareness who ran the conference, gave all participants a copy of 'The Happy Kit', which she has written. The pocket-sized, light blue booklet covers 14 key areas of wellbeing, such as anxiety, bereavement, self care and sleep, to help the reader improve their state of mind if they are struggling. Definitions, facts and tips all make the booklet appear very reassuring, as it provides a solution to issues that may be hard to speak openly about. It is definitely one to look out for when it becomes more widely available, as you never know when you might need it.

Overall, the day was a very insightful look into the challenges that some young people might face. But as well as informative, the conference was a perfect balance of serious and fun, making it enjoyable. I know for myself, and from talking to my peers who took part, that we all have taken a lot of information away, and the Happy Kit has all that and more should we require it. A big thanks to Stacey Miller, as well as all the other workshop leaders for organising such an enlightening and entertaining event.

Young Vets Club Competition - Highly Commended

In February the eco-club launched the Young Vets Club Competition. The task was to design a cartoon to encapsulate the story of Ekari an orphaned elephant in Myanmar due to her mother being caught in a snare trap. The competition aim was to raise awareness of the need for Worldwide Vets to help to save animals in need like Ekari.

Oozies are elephant handlers who work in Myanmar and they have a close relationship with their elephants. They take great care of the elephants, making sure they are fed well, bathed daily and free to roam. These elephants have been very well trained to work in the forests of Myanmar to bring out logs as part of the logging industry. The logging industry has now been reduced to protect the forest habitats and the elephants no longer have much work. They are released into the forests at night to feed but are vulnerable to poachers from neighbouring countries who capture them for the tourist trade. Only the trained adult elephants are useful to the poachers so the babies are often left behind as orphans. This is Ekari's story...




